PROGRAMMES AND RESOURCES OVERVIEW

UK research reveals that a young adult (19–24 years), who can recall four or more interactions with an employer while at school, is five times less likely to be not in employment, education or training (NEET).¹

WORK INSPIRATION

Work Inspiration is an exciting employer-led work exploration programme for students in year levels 10–13.

It inspires and motivates them through conversations and active engagement with people in the workplace.

YEAR LEVELS: 10–13

This employer-led programme:

- further develops school/employer partnerships
- supports and aligns to transition programmes such as Gateway and STAR
- expands employers' understanding of the career education needs of young people
- raises students' awareness of the diversity of working life and their own developing 'employability skills' and links to Vocational Pathways
- promotes parental involvement.

EMPLOYER LINKED PROGRAMMES

INDUSTRY BIG DAY OUT

Promotes and strengthens connections between local employers, industry and schools by providing an opportunity for students and career influencers to meet with employers to understand the range of industry skills needs, and the options and career pathways available.

PAVE MALAGA

Nurturing Va, Nurturing Dreams

PAVE MALAGA is a programme embedded in a Pasifika cultural context. It equips Pasifika families and their community influencers, with the career tools, skills and knowledge to support and guide their families on their career journeys.

MALAGA: PASIFIKA PLANNING FOR SUCCESS

A professional development programme for secondary school teachers to build their capability to deliver culturally responsive career education for Pasifika students.

RESOURCES

DREAM AND DISCOVER

Dream and Discover helps students in Years 7–8 to gain awareness of themselves and their futures, and prepare for the move to secondary school.

YEAR LEVELS: 7–8

EXPLORE AND COMPARE

Explore and Compare helps students in Years 9–10 to make subject choices through a process of learning and career planning.

YEAR LEVELS: 9–10

THE REAL GAME

The Real Game is a career education resource designed for students in Years 9–10. It introduces students to the world of work and helps them to develop an understanding of the options and opportunities available to them and the implications and importance of their choices.

YEAR LEVELS: 9–10

CAREER MALAGA

Career Malaga helps Pasifika students in Years 9–13 think about their career journeys. Malaga means "journey" in Samoan – it symbolises the past, present and future journeys of Pasifika peoples. Students are encouraged to think about who they are – their cultural identity, special interests and strengths – and how these all can lead to fulfilling futures.

YEAR LEVELS: 9–13

DECIDE AND PREPARE

Decide and Prepare helps students in Years 11–13 to make choices about tertiary education and work and prepare for the move from school.

YEAR LEVELS: 11–13
